45 Routines to Teach in the First Weeks of School: A Good Start

There are so many routines to teach early in the school year-it can be a bit overwhelming. Where do you begin? Of course, there is no one right answer-no definitive list. One way to start is to think about ones your students need to successfully navigate the first day. Mike divides the routines into 4 categories: beginning of the day routines, end of the day routines, throughout the day routines, and academic routines. A little time invested in teaching the routines of the room pays huge dividends throughout the year. Students will feel safer, be more independent, and you'll be able to spend more time focused on teaching and learning.
